Project description

Executive summary [200 words maximum]

Ruapehu CD and Fire Rescue First Response ltd (FRFR) have designed a Marae Resilience program to deliver training to all marae in the Ruapehu Rohe. This will enable marae that have been identified as potential CDCs the ability to self-manage initially during an event and assist the local community. Ruapehu has 25 marae that will benefit from the training. Ruapehu CD has held local hui to see if there is a need for this training to which local lwi has acknowledged there is. Initial funding has been sort through other avenues however been unsuccessful as it was deemed that we were not affected by Cyclone Gabrielle.

Challenge/opportunity [200 words maximum]

Māori make up 43% of the population in the Ruapehu, and as mentioned Ruapehu has approximately 25 Marae across the region. Ruapehu CD and the Horizons CDEM group are committed to growing meaningful partnership with Iwi and Māori. We aim to strive towards enhancing the readiness and resilience across the Ruapehu to ensure Ruapehu CD is best placed to support the community's response to and recovery from emergencies.

Ruapehu CD in partnership with Fire Rescue First Response ltd have developed a program of several short courses we feel will benefit lwi through all the 4R's of an event, the courses are,

- CIMS 4, (2 days)
- Welfare Centre Staff Functions, (1 day)
- Welfare Centre Supervisor, (1 day)

- Animal Welfare, (1 day)
- General Rescue, (2 days)
- Flood Rescue, (2 days)
- First Aid, (2 days and or 1 day refresher)
- Fire Warden training. (1 day)

All courses are NZQA accredited which also could benefit those that attend with skills and knowledge for future employment as well as obviously building resilience for the day to day running of a marae. To add to this the Ruapehu region relies on volunteerism during events with all FENZ fire brigades in the region are volunteer brigades. So, when delivering this training it will also provide chances to recruit / inspire individuals to become volunteers for the emergency response agencies CD, FENZ and St John.

Alignment with priorities and objectives of the National Disaster Resilience Strategy (NDRS) [200 words maximum]

This application looks to develop our collective capacity to anticipate and respond to the effects of an emergency event, to minimise those impacts by responding effectively. We also recognise the importance of Māori in emergency management this program will integrate lwi / Māori at all levels of emergency management in a way which is most suitable for Iwi / Māori.

With the Emergency Management Bill that has been presented to Government stating that Maori play a significant role in emergency management this training will provide a great foundation for local Maori to become that vital part of our Emergency Operations Centres when activated and being vital links to our remote communities that have the potential to be isolated as what happened to areas of New Zealand during Cyclone Gabrielle.

Application of outcomes/benefits to sector [200 words maximum]

Māori will benefit significantly from emergency management training in several ways. Firstly, such training will empower Māori communities to effectively prepare for, respond to, and recover from natural disasters, which are particularly relevant in the Ruapehu. By equipping Māori with the skills and knowledge to handle emergencies, the training will help to reduce the vulnerability of Māori communities and improve their resilience in the face of disasters. Additionally, emergency management training can also facilitate the incorporation of traditional Māori knowledge and practices into disaster preparedness and response efforts, thereby honouring and preserving indigenous wisdom while enhancing overall community safety. Furthermore, by involving Māori in emergency management processes, the training can contribute to fostering greater inclusivity, collaboration, and trust between Māori and government agencies, ultimately leading to more effective and culturally sensitive emergency responses. Overall, emergency management training holds the potential to enhance the well-being and safety of Māori communities and contribute to the overall resilience of the Ruapehu region.
