Executive summary [200 words maximum]				
Given the work underway for strengthening evacuation arrangements for Westport (Resilient Westport Programme) there is an opportunity to share activities and replicate where possible for similar evacuation planning for Greymouth, Hokitika and Franz Josef townships.				
This application is to fund a project to extend evacuation planning arrangements for Westport, to envelope a further three locations on the West Coast.				
On 24 January 2024 the Coordinating Executive Group (CEG) agreed to submit applications to the NEMA Resilience fund for flood evacuation planning for Greymouth, Hokitika and Franz Josef for an estimated \$45k over one year. It was understood that with additional funding there is an opportunity through the Resilient Westport evacuation planning to replicate or translate this work where possible to include Greymouth, Hokitika and Franz Josef.				
Evacuation planning arrangements are of varying quality and consistency across the region. This reflects of history of emergency planning occurring in absence of a regional approach. As a result stakeholders and communities have varying levels of involvement and understanding of what planning does exist and how they contribute. The Resilient Westport work has a strong community and stakeholder engagement element, along with the necessity to work closely with councils to understand changing risk hazard profiles and flood forecasting models. The benefit of this approach should not be lost on enhancing planning in Greymouth, Hokitika and Franz Josef.				

Challenge/opportunity [200 words maximum]

As a part of the 'Resilient Westport Package' approved by Government in May 2023, \$500,000 was tagged to improving emergency management arrangements for Westport over two years. This work is about to commence with the recruitment of a project lead. The project lead will work closely with the other strands of the extensive programme of works involve in 'Resilient Westport'.

The main aspect of this work is to formalise evaluation arrangements, alongside stakeholders including both response agencies and the affected communities.

The opportunity therefore exists to transfer and extend this work for both Grey and Westland districts. The objectives of this project are:

The purpose of this role is to lead and coordinate a comprehensive program for emergency management planning in the Westport community, under the guidance of the West Coast Emergency Management (WCEM). This position is pivotal in implementing the PARA (protect, avoid, retreat, and adapt) framework, ensuring the development of robust strategies and responses. The role will work collaboratively with a multi-disciplinary team within the Resilient Westport Programme. The role will support the coordination across various project teams, ensuring effective community engagement, and will contribute to all phases of emergency management - preparation, response, and recovery.

This work is one of several strands of work of the 'Resilient Westport Package' announced by the Prime Minister in May 2023.

\$500,000 over two years

Alignment with priorities and objectives of the National Disaster Resilience Strategy (NDRS) [200 words maximum]

This Project is strongly aligned with the NDRS's third priority: *"enabling, empowering, and supporting community resilience: building a culture of resilience in New Zealand so that everyone can participate in and contribute to communities' – and the nation's – resilience".*

This project requires a multi-agency model to work alongside communities to develop, educate and exercise evacuation arrangements. Focus will be on reducing levels of community harm, building community resilience and wellbeing, and empowering our communities. The project will result in a regional evacuation framework that can be utilised across relevant communities throughout the region and other parts of Aotearoa.

Alignment with Principles and Allocation Preferences [200 words maximum]

This project will ensure that there is alignment with the principles and allocation preferences of the fund, as follows:

Principles:

- NEMA provides leadership supported.
- A fair and transparent applications-based process, with allocation decided by NEMA noted.
- The Fund is available to CDEM Groups, other organisations and individuals noted.
- CDEM Groups monitor projects supported.
- A local/regional focus (not complex, multi-region / national) this project is focused at a district level with opportunity to roll out learnings at a regional level, or more widely if appropriate.

- Values the role of Māori in the emergency management system *cultural values / community involvement is central to the project.*
- Applications allow for NEMA involvement if it is required supported.

Allocation Preferences:

- Aligns with National Disaster Resilience Strategy (NDRS) as described above, there is excellent alignment with the third priority in the NDRS.
- Achieves equity of outcomes for Māori communities, marae, hapū, iwi and Māori organisations *Iwi are a key stakeholder of this project.*
- Outcome focused (will make a material difference) the outcomes of this project are described in the following section and show that it is outcome focussed. Specifically, meaningful community support will be realised. In addition, a regional framework will be developed that could be applied more widely across Aotearoa.
- Applicable in other regions / CDEM Groups yes.
- Supports national consistency the framework can be tailored based on location and context.
- Wider funding / resource commitment (co-funding, ongoing funding committed) maintaining evacuation planning is the responsibility of WCEM in collaboration with key stakeholders, lwi and the community.
- Builds on existing work. The intent is that the opportunity is not lost to build on the Resilient Westport work to expand and transfer to other centres across the region that have a river flood risk profile.

Operational expenditure (Opex) is preferred but Capital expenditure (Capex) is not excluded – *all project expenditure is Opex.*

Application of outcomes/benefits to sector [200 words maximum]

The benefits are many and wide ranging. The Project will:

- Provide a regional guide that we can utilize in the ongoing evacuation and adaptation conversations across the region
- Reduce levels of community harm, build community resilience and wellbeing, and empower our communities,
- Improve the engagement experience for better outcomes,
- Recognise that different cultural approaches impact resilience, and respond accordingly,
- Strengthen local and regional district and regional council involvement in evacuation planning to inform and evolve planning as risk profile and protection works change.
- Strengthen relationships between WCEM, critical infrastrure agencies and emergency services, and the community.

Involve multiple agencies early on in community engagement to reduce 'silo' efforts, avoid duplication of effort, and support a coordinated and more effective response.

Maintaining and developing evacuation planning will be the responsibility of WCEM, alongside councils, critical infrastructure agencies, emergency services, lwi and the community
